### What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A Neighbourhood Plan contains planning policies, which will be used to inform decisions on planning applications. The Town Council worked with a group of residents and councillors to put together a plan for Biggleswade. The process involved various stages of community engagement and formal consultation and a rigorous examination to ensure that the Plan meets legal requirements. The Plan is now ready for residents to have their say via a referendum.

# What does Biggleswade's plan include?

- Helping to ensure that development is well-designed and sustainable
- Designating 15 Local Green Spaces, including Back Meadows, the Jubilee Wood and the allotments, and also protecting the Common and Green Wheel
- Encouraging diversification of the Town Centre, enhancing its vitality
- Supporting employment-related development, subject to considering impacts on residential properties and the local environment
- Protecting the historic environment, including the Conservation Area in the town centre, and supporting the sensitive use of listed buildings
- Providing better facilities for cycling and walking and mobility scooters, and ensuring proper access for emergency vehicles
- Encouraging the development of community, sports and recreation facilities, particularly football, and seeking further land for allotments

# What happens if the plan receives a majority "yes" vote?

If successful at referendum, the Neighbourhood Plan has to be 'made' and become part of the statutory development plan, so will have to be considered with the Central Bedfordshire Local Plan and national policy in making decisions on planning applications. If the Neighbourhood Plan is rejected, only national and Local Plan policies will apply, as at present.



MAKE YOUR BIKE SAFER Biggleswade Community Safety Group will be at the Kings Corner Community Centre (Kings Reach) on 22nd October from 1pm for anti-theft bike marking.

In order to qualify for a FREE bike marking please bring your bike together with a valid email address. They also need some contact details. Biggleswade Community Safety Group will photograph your bike and then register all the required details directly onto the national Bike Register, which is used to recover stolen bikes by all English police forces. Please note that he bike marking will only be FREE if registered on the day.

#### **NEWS FROM BIGGLESWADE ORGANISATIONS**



Representatives met in Café Mocha on the High Street, on Tuesday 6 September, to reflect on past activities and plan future ones. It is a great place for regular customers and visitors to the town to meet over a leisurely coffee and a bite to eat. Prices are kept as low

as possible and care is taken over where supplies are sourced to encourage care for the environment and support for ethical suppliers. Unfortunately opening hours are currently reduced due to a shortage of staff to run it so this needs to be addressed to maximise the use of this valuable resource.

The "Warm Spaces" initiative was also on the agenda. We had a brief presentation from a representative from the Labour Hall, which will be one of the venues used to provide a place for people to go for warmth and company during the winter. The Churches will encourage people to volunteer as helpers and are already looking into whether their buildings could be used.

Our Church buildings are in regular use for a wide range of activities and during this period of National Mourning as a place for people to relax and reflect. Kings Corner in Biggleswade East also opens for people to drop in and chat. In addition it is used for initiatives such as Social Prescribing and Time Banking.

Joint services are held and the next will be at 6pm on Sunday 23 October at Trinity Methodist Church in Shortmead street. It will be in support of a Global initiative – One World Week.

One of the new Facebook groups is Biggleswade Living **Streets**, hosted by Andrew Skilton. He also helps lead the Biggleswade Walking and Cycling Group and is experienced in these subjects as he works in that field. Recently Central Bedfordshire Parking held a consultation on its proposed Street Unfortunately Council Management Strategy. as with other consultations this one was of short duration and did not come to our attention in time to include it within the newsletter.

The headline comments from residents were 'Please stop the footway parking and please let us have some visible and robust parking enforcement of general parking contraventions in town centres. The consultation cited many problems and possible solutions, but did not detail WHICH solutions Central Beds preferred.



As you will see from our article on page 13, training is being offered to learn how to use your smart phone or tablet safely, which will enable you to find out how to access Facebook and perhaps join one of the Biggleswade groups. You would be made very welcome.

#### THE FRIENDS OF ST ANDREW'S

The oldest building in Biggleswade is without a doubt the Parish Church, and arguably the most beautiful and interesting. It has a fascinating history, beginning as a tiny building a fraction of its present size, almost 800 years ago. In 1720 the tower and the entire back of the church collapsed, perhaps due to an earthquake; in 1785 it was filled with the homeless after the town's Great Fire, then it housed the town's primitive fire -fighting equipment including long 'drags' for pulling blazing thatch from roofs; later on body snatchers came to the Churchyard by night to dig up the body of a man to sell, they hoped, in London for medical research. They were arrested in a market square inn, the Catherine Wheel.

The cost of restoring and maintaining such a medieval building is considerable and that is why 'The Friends of St Andrew's', a registered charity, was set up in 1985. Since then its members have worked tirelessly to provide the necessary funds. We have raised £429,000 and have paid for the restoration of the Church tower, the tower clock, the Church bells, the south porch, the organ and a huge amount of stonework.

We have 155 members, but we do need more. Everyone who is a Friend supports us in this vital work, has their name inscribed on the Roll of Members in the Church and receives an annual newsletter.

Please consider joining and giving us your support. The annual membership fee is £10 for adults, £2 for under 18s. Sponsorship by local companies, providers of professional services, shops and offices is very welcome indeed. # £15 AFFORDABLE BROADBAND

**People on certain benefits or low income can get fibre broadband for £15 each month** as BT, Sky, NOW Broadband and Virgin social tariffs could help with rising household costs. One way millions of people who are on Universal Credit or certain other benefits may be able to slash their bills is to choose a 'social tariff' broadband package, which is available from most of the big providers from as little as £15 per month. These include BT, Sky, Virgin and NOW Broadband. Leaders of the UK's major fixed broadband, landline and mobile operators agreed a set of commitments with the UK Government in June, which are designed to support households through the crisis.

#### LEARN HOW TO USE YOUR SMARTPHONE OR LAPTOP

BedsRCC charity are running a digital inclusion project called "You Can Do IT!" and have had a group running at the Kings Corner Community Centre in Biggleswade since February. It runs on a Tuesday afternoon from 1.30 to 3.15.

The focus of their programme is to give people the means, skills and confidence to access online services. Required even more now most services are only accessible on line.

They provide free, one to one support to people who need help in using smartphones, tablets and laptops. Typically, help is given on using a tablet or smartphone for the first time, using the internet safely, using emails, searching for information on the internet, filling in forms online, the use of passwords, or making and receiving voice and video calls.

BedsRCC are funded by the NHS Charities Together framework so have an additional emphasis on accessing health and wellbeing services. Staffed by volunteers, we run small groups which are person centred. The support lasts for as many weeks as necessary to meet the needs of individual learners.

To obtain a place, people can either self-refer by filling out an online form at <a href="www.ywb.org.uk/IT">www.ywb.org.uk/IT</a> or by leaving a voicemail message by calling 01234 838771. Due to the difference in individual needs it is difficult to estimate when the next place will become available but you can be added to the waiting list.

# H.M. GOVT. Emergency alert system to launch in October across Great Britain

An emergency warning system, allowing alerts about severe weather and other life-threatening events to be sent to mobile phones, will go live in October in England, Scotland and Wales. The Cabinet Office says the technology will alert up to 85% of the population.

The messages will be sent automatically to any smartphone which is switched on, although it is possible to opt out by changing a mobile phone setting. Trials of the alerts were held in Reading and East Suffolk this year. Every phone in England, Scotland and Wales, will receive a "welcome message" in October. The system will eventually cover the whole of the UK, says the Government.

The Cabinet Office says the alerts, which will look and sound different to standard messages, will be able to give highly localised warnings of flooding – fires – extreme weather – public health emergencies. Terror attacks could also be added to the list of potential scenarios to trigger a message.

When you get an emergency alert

Your phone or tablet may make a loud siren-like sound, even if it's set on silent, vibrate or read out the alert. The sound and vibration will last for about 10 seconds. Stop what you're doing and follow the instructions in the alert. Sometimes an alert will include a phone number or a link to the GOV.UK website for more information.

The Government and mobile phone networks are testing emergency alerts. You may get an alert if you live in, or travel through, a test area.

If you're driving or riding when you get an alert find somewhere safe to stop before using your phone or tablet. It is illegal to use a hand-held device while driving or riding.

If you want to see an alert again you can do so at www.gov.uk/alerts You can also search for them on your phone or tablet

**If you get reminders about an alert** you canturn these reminders off. Search your settings for 'emergency alerts'.

# **WOULD YOU CONSIDER BECOMING A COUNCILLOR?**



With local elections planned for 4 May 2023, Central Bedfordshire Council are inviting residents to consider standing as local councillors. If you're passionate, proactive and want to make a difference then it could be for you. It's an opportunity for you to represent the

views of local people and shape the future of your local community.

Central Bedfordshire Council currently comprises of 59 councillors, although this will be increasing to 63 from May 2023. A booklet has been produced which explains in detail who is eligible to stand, the role of a councillor and explains the steps involved to become a candidate. Councillors don't have to be highly educated or have a profession. Skills gained through raising a family, caring for a sick or disabled relative, volunteering or being active in faith or community groups can be just as valuable.

The councillor's role centres around community leadership and engagement, and responsibilities include:

- representing the ward for which they are elected
- decision-making developing and reviewing council policy
- scrutinising decisions taken by the councillors on the executive or cabinet
- regulatory, quasi-judicial and statutory duties

Councillors may stand for individual parties or as independents. For the latter they need to apply to Central Bedfordshire's Electoral Services Department. You must make sure that you are officially nominated as the election date draws nearer. This means getting 10 people to sign nomination papers (signatories must be registered electors in the ward where you wish to stand) available from your local council's democratic services department. You must also give your consent in writing to your nomination. All the necessary documents must be submitted 19 working days before the day of the election.
